Dinosaur fossils were being unearthed before they had a name, some people thought they were the remains



The Iguanodon is estimated to have weighed about 4 tonnes (1 Asian elephant), measured 10 metres in length (1 whale shark) and stood over 2 metres tall (1 ostrich).

The backbone and tail were supported by tendons that turned to bone as the Iguanodon grew.
